## **Super Sight Screeners**

On October 23 four Lions from SRLC visited Guilford Elementary School in Baltimore City to provide preschool vision screening to the kindergartners. Lions Dick Bloomquist, Dale Strait, Catherine Violette, and Ollie Wittig arrived and set up for the screening. Lions performed different tasks, screening with the SureSight, the Titmus screening, recording, and parent contact letters. Based on the screening results each of the twenty nine youngsters was determined to be PASS or FAIL. Any youngster who failed may have one or my of the conditions that can cause amblyopia-lazy eye, a condition, which, if caught early can be corrected with good results. Parents of the referred students will be notified of the possible defect and provided information about follow-up with an eye care professional. There will also be follow up contact with the parents by the screening club to insure that a professional exam has been obtained. Lions can provide help with eyeglasses for tested students if the parent is indigent and cannot afford them. The exam period was a lively one as the high energy of the pre schooler's was evident that morning. These screening sessions are another example of Lions living up to the motto, "We Serve."
