We need to develop a survey for all members to ask for suggested new service projects and what services we can provide,

It was decided to form a committee to investigate a crab/shrimp feast as new fundraiser. Lion Chris will check the availability of the St Martin's in the Field.

We need to work with other organizations - other Lions Clubs or other service clubs.
