SCHOLARSHIP RECIPIENTS VISIT SRLC

The SRLC Scholarship Committee, Lions Mary Dare, Roger Knauth, Trent Kutsch, and Ollie Wittig worked diligently to review the applications from qualified students at Severna Park High School and Broadneck High School and concluded deliberations in March. The three scholarships that are awarded, two at Severna Park and one at Broadneck, consider the applicant's academic performance as indicated by the transcript, participation in higher level courses – Honors or Advanced Placement, involvement in school and community activities, financial need, teacher recommendations, and the individuals potential to be successful in college and career. The scholarship award of one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) per year can be renewed for three additional years provided the circumstances on which the original award was made do not change. Funds are sent to the college or university in two installments in July and December.

The *E. Roy Shawn Memorial Scholarship* named for the charter president of our club is presented to two seniors at Severna Park High School's annual awards ceremony. The Patrick Dionne Memorial *Scholarship* is awarded to a graduating senior at Broadneck High School and is presented at the annual awards ceremony.

At Anne Arundel Community College the *Lawrence F. Marcous and George C. Councill Memorial Scholarship* is awarded annually. Our club makes an annual donation to the AACC Foundation and a scholarship selection committee at the college administers and awards an annual scholarship, usually in July.

A brief biography of the scholarship recipients for 2007 appears below.

Severna Park High School

Vera Goldberg is one of this year's recipients of the E. Roy Shawn Memorial Scholarship. Her academic credentials are very impressive considering that she has taken honors and advanced courses almost exclusively during her high school career and has maintained straight "A" grades over four years. Academics is not Vera's only interest and she has found time to be actively involved in Key Club, National Honor Society, Spanish Club, Amnesty International, INTERACT (community service), Student Government, and varsity cross country. In addition Vera has managed to find time to be a volunteer at a hospital, her church, the library and held a part time summer job. Her list of awards and recognitions is also very impressive. Vera's college plans include a dual major in Spanish and Biology that will lead to a pre-medical program and she will complete the undergraduate portion at the University of Pennsylvania.

Sarah Cash also has compiled a very impressive academic record over four years in a rigorous program of honors and advanced courses. In addition to academic excellence, Sarah has been an active member and officer in the French Club, the Book Club, National Honor Society, and the school orchestra. Community involvement has included active participation in her church youth program and choir. During her junior year Sarah was an exchange student in a study abroad program in France and was immersed in a different cultural and language experience. Sarah has been recognized as a national Merit Commended Scholar and has achieved superior ratings at county solo and ensemble competitions. Sarah plans to pursue a dual program in French and International Studies as an undergraduate at Franklin College in Switzerland, an American college founded in 1969, and which specializes in international study.

During his tenure at Broadneck High School *Quinn Carbine* has consistently enrolled and excelled in a rigorous program of Honors and Advanced courses and his academic class ranking places him in the upper ten percent of his class of just over five hundred students. In addition to academic excellence, Quinn has been involved in the National Honor Society as a member and volunteer tutor, has attained Honor Roll standing every marking period from the sixth grade to the present. In the community Quinn has been active in his church in several capacities but he sites his five year participation as a member/team leader of the Catholic Heart Youth Workcamp as one of the most rewarding endeavors. Quinn has also managed to find time to be a goalkeeper for the community soccer team for seven years and has become a self- taught automotive sound system installer. His teachers and pastor describe Quinn as an intelligent, personable, young man with well defined goals and a penchant to be willing to help his classmates and friends. Quinn plans a technical career as a mechanical engineer and he will do his undergraduate work at the University of Maryland, College Park.

VISION SCREENING

Screening Success ~ April 2007

Lions VDG Dick Bloomquist, Roger Knauth, Dale Strait, and Ollie Wittig, visited St. Martin's Day School on Benfield Road on April 12 and 13 to provide preschool vision screening to nearly fifty youngsters. The delightful and chatty youngsters were given a brief talk about the screening process, shown samples of screening pictures, sat for their "picture" in front of a camera that lights up and plays music, and given a sticker with a Lion saying "A Lion Screened My Eyes" which proved to be a hit with the kids.

Lion Roger earned the title, PCO-permanent camera operator- for his almost flawless work behind the lens. Lions Dale and Dick served ably as escort and picture interpreters, and Lion Ollie managed the paperwork.

The photos and consent forms will be forwarded to Iowa University for evaluation by eye care professionals who will be looking for indicators of possible amblyogenic disorders which, if not corrected promptly, could lead to serious and permanent vision problems. In about a month the results will be returned to parents and will indicate PASS or REFER. Parents of children in the latter category will be advised to have their child seen by an eye care professional and a report is to be forwarded to Lions to insure that the follow up has been done.

The preschool vision screening program is just one of the vision services offered by Lions whose focus has always been sight conservation.

Eight is Great!!

Since 2000, Lions have been offering acuity vision screening at the annual Health Fair at Anne Arundel Community College. This joint effort between the Annapolis Lions Club and the Severn River Lions Club has offered the acuity testing to mostly college age young people and some adults. Not only is this a service rendered but it helps acquaint the community with what Lions do.

On April 11,2007 Lion Steve Smith-Annapolis joined Severn River Lions, VDG Dick Bloomquist, Roger Knauth, Dick Maurer, Dale Strait, and Ollie Wittig at the Student Center for the acuity screening. During the four hour session seventy five mostly college age young adults were screened. While the majority passed, a few showed indications of potentially serious vision problems and were encouraged to have a professional eye exam as soon as possible. Not only did the acuity screening help individuals identify potential vision problems, it gave us a chance to tell about what Lions do in the community. Membership materials describing the Severn River Lions Club and Lionism were available for distribution at the session. The session also provided the opportunity to test District 22-A's recently acquired Titmus I-200 screeningr device. We are looking forward to year nine at the AACC Health Fair.

Camp Blaze

And last but certainly not least, SRLC teamed with South Anne Arundel Lions on May 5^{th} to perform Preschool Vision Screening on about 30 youngsters. At this annual event, we participate in 3 ways – outside we sell tickets for the food booths (all proceeds benefit Camp Blaze); inside upstairs we distribute membership information and flyers about various educational flyers focused on diabetic eye disease; inside downstairs we perform the PSVS. All in all, a very full day.

Those "active" members who receive exception will pay a \$5 quarterly meal surcharge. Others will be considered for "MAL" or "Affiliate" status. WEST ARUNDEL CELEBRATES FIRST CHARTER NIGHT IN STYLE

Research Uncovers New Weapons Against The Three Major Causes Of Blindness "Glaucoma is often called "The Silent Thief of Sight."

The bank vice president told the eye doctor he simply needed "a pair of reading glasses, because I'm not getting any younger!" But when VSP network doctor Amir Khoshnevis, O.D., examined the patient, he made a dramatic discovery that would help save the middle-aged banker's eyesight.

"Dr. K," as many patients call him, discovered that the banker was actually in the early stages of glaucoma - a chronic eye disorder that can lead to blindness if untreated. Because it usually displays no symptoms until the patient's eyesight has been permanently damaged, glaucoma is often called "the silent thief of sight."

"That eye exam was extremely important, because the early detection allowed us to begin treatment right away," says Dr. Khoshnevis, who practices in Charlotte, N.C. "Fortunately, the latest medical research has led to some promising new treatments for glaucoma – including four medications designed to reduce elevated eye-pressure on the optic nerve, which is what usually causes the damage to vision."

Soon after his eye exam a few years ago, the bank employee began using a newly developed eye drop medication that enhances the flow of fluid from the eyeball, thus relieving pressure on the optic nerve. "This patient continues to enjoy excellent vision today," says the VSP doctor, "and there's now little risk that he will lose his vision because of glaucoma."

"I think his case is a good example of how the latest research on eye disorders is increasingly helping to protect our patients from disease-related vision loss."

While describing the cutting-edge research, Dr. K pinpointed some "very exciting new tools" that are helping patients fend off three major eye disorders - glaucoma, age-related macular degeneration and diabetic retinopathy - that are responsible for most of the blindness or impaired vision affecting 10 million Americans today.


Glaucoma: Research shows that glaucoma can often be treated effectively by a new generation of medications that lower eye-pressure, and in some cases by a laser-surgery technique ("trabeculoplasty") that "unclogs" blocked eye-openings to enhance outflow of pressure-causing fluids.

Age-Related Macular Degeneration (ARMD): Usually triggered by deterioration of light-sensitive cells in the "macula" region of the retina, ARMD causes most vision loss among those over age 65. Research has confirmed that new treatments involving drugs and antibodies containing a substance known as Anti-VEGF, can significantly slow down - or in some cases, even slightly reverse - the form of the disease that results in vision loss. Other studies show that Anti-VEGF drugs and antibodies combined with a laser procedure known as "Photodynamic Therapy" (or PDT) can slow down ARMD and decrease blood vessel growth.

Diabetic Retinopathy: Caused by diabetes-related damage to the retina, this eye ailment is best treated by managing the patient's diabetes effectively. Where damage has already occurred, however, a form of laser therapy ("Panretinal Laser Photocoagulation" or PRP) has been shown in studies to be effective at stabilizing injured tissues and slowing down further damage.

Says the upbeat Dr. Khoshnevis: "This exciting research is bringing new hope to patients with vision-threatening conditions, because we're now able to treat them in ways that wouldn't have been possible, even 10 years ago!"
