Sarah's House is a supportive housing program for homeless women, children, and men in Anne Arundel County providing case management, childcare, transportation, and emergency services. Sarah's House takes its name and spirit from the hospitality of the biblical character Sarah, wife of Abraham. The Anne Arundel County Department of Social Services performs initial screenings for potential guests. Services:

- Housing, including meals, laundry, and shower facilities. Emergency shelter for 66 people for up to 90 days. Transitional housing for 22 families for up to 18 months.
- Parenting and life skills training
- Mental health assessment and referral
- Transportation
- Licensed child care
 - Computer classes
- General Equivalency Diploma (GED) training
- Substance abuse assessment and counseling

Outreach services for on year following exit

- Employment/workforce development program
- After school programs and tutoring

The question posed to the board was would SRLC be interested in possibly using their new building which would be attached to a Green Hornet facility. While no details were available, after discussion, the board stated that we are interested and would like to be kept informed of the status.

Activities Donations – Treasurer Lion Bill O'Neil presented a spending plan developed by his budget committee for our activities for the year. There was some discussion and minor changes, with the final plan as attached. 50th Anniversary Celebration – Lion Sue Parks reported that we have 114 paid and 3 not paid for the celebration. She is expecting between 121 and 123 as the final count.

HEALTH FAIR VISION SCREENING

On April 5, 2006 Severn River Lions **Dick Bloomquist, Dick Maurer, Bob Muchow, Dale Strait and Ollie Wittig** joined Annapolis Lions **Dean Hall and Steve Smith** to provide acuity vision screening at the annual Health Fair sponsored by Anne Arundel Community College. This is the seventh year for this collaborative effort by both Lions Clubs and is another example of Lions providing vision services to the community. Forty-five mostly college age adults took advantage of the screening which tested their near and far vision. The Lions used the Titmus machine for the screenings which lasted approximately five minutes. The screening results are not a definitive vision testing such as offered by an ophthalmologist but the test does help to identify potential vision problems. The majority of the individuals tested appeared to have "normal" vision but several were encouraged to make an appointment with an eye care professional for a more thorough examination.

The annual health fair offers, in addition to vision screening service, a variety if booths and displays related to many health issues facing the public today. The health fair also provided an opportunity to acquaint the public with our organization and the services that Lions provide. Membership information brochures were made available to those tested and the Lions were only too willing to answer questions.



SCHOLARSHIP COMMITTEE FINAL REPORT 2006

The Scholarship Committee (Lions Mary Dare, Trent Kutch, Ken Tschantre, Jon Valett, and Ollie Wittig) had a daunting task choosing just two recipients for the E. Roy Shawn Memorial Scholarship at Severna Park High School from the twenty-four original applicants and just one recipient for the Broadneck High School Scholarship from the original list of six applicants. Interested students were required to submit a written application, an official transcript, recommendations from two teachers or counselors, and a personal essay. Three sessions were needed to do a complete review before the committee narrowed the final choices. Factors considered included the applicants' academic performance, enrollment in challenging courses, financial need, participation in co-curricular activities, honors and recognition attained, service to the school or community, teacher recommendations, stated career goals, a personal essay describing why the individual felt that he/she was deserving of the award and an assessment of the individuals' potential to succeed in college. After careful deliberation the committee finally narrowed the choices.

Seniors **Hannah Bourquin and Julie Musgrave** were selected to receive the E. Roy Shawn Memorial Scholarship at Severna Park High School. Hannah plans to attend Elon College and become a special education teacher. Julie will attend Villanova University and major in biology. Hannah and Julie were presented their scholarships at the Awards Ceremony on April 27, 2006.

Matthew Llano was chosen to receive the SRLC Broadneck High School Scholarship. Matthew plans to attend the University of Richmond and major in either pre-medical or pre-veterinary studies. Matthew will receive his scholarship at the Awards Ceremony on May 31, 2006.

Annual Exams Are Key to Healthy Eyes

For doctor Kurt K. DeVito, O.D., three little words are enough to describe what's needed for good eye health: annual eye exam.

"I've been providing eye exams for more than 12 years now," says the optometrist from Norfolk, Virginia. "During that time, I've diagnosed four different tumors and several cases of diabetes in patients who didn't even know they had a health problem. As you might imagine, I encourage everyone to get an annual eye exam — not just an eye screening!" Dr. DeVito stresses that there's a big difference between eye exams and eye screenings.

"Screenings are partial, limited eye assessments that take place in locations other than an eye doctor's office," he says. "Typically, a screening will be performed by a nurse at school, a pediatrician in the office or maybe even a clerk giving motorists a vision test for a driver's license. There's no doubt that screenings can be helpful at times in detecting some problems with vision, but I encourage patients to have a thorough eye exam in an optometrist's or ophthalmologist's office," Dr. DeVito says. "The doctor can take an entire eyecare history and patients can take advantage of the doctor's on-site diagnostic and treatment tools."


Dr. DeVito recently installed a state-of-the-art instrument that detects glaucoma by examining tiny fibers in a patient's optic nerve. "This new equipment allows us to spot damage in nerve fibers long before it would show up in the traditional eye pressure test. Early detection is crucial with glaucoma, and this test is only available during a thorough eye exam in the eye doctor's office. You won't get it during a screening."

According to Dr. DeVito, annual eye exams also provide other benefits to patients. The eyecare doctor can:

- Measure for prescription lenses to correct nearsightedness, farsightedness and astigmatism.
- Check for the presence of eye diseases and conditions such as glaucoma, macular degeneration, cataracts and diabetic retinopathy.
- Make sure your eyes are working well together, while also evaluating your eyes as part of your overall health.

"In recent years, I've had several situations in which I detected the presence of blood in the back of the eye, which is one of the first signs of diabetes," says Dr. DeVito. "Those patients first learned they had a serious health condition during a routine eye exam in my office. I think that's a great example of how worthwhile an annual eye exam can be."
