

The Glasses Get Loaded and Sorted

On Friday, October 12 Lions Carl Gilbert, Chuck Horne, Dick Maurer, Lillian McGraw, Peter McGraw, Jon Valett, Bill Zelenakas, and Ollie Wittig joined forces to load all of the eyeglasses that had been collected SRLC's dozen collection sites the past six months. About twenty five boxes of glasses were loaded into Dick Maurer's van and it was estimated that nearly 3,000 pairs of eyeglasses had been donated since the last sorting. The loading crew completed the loading in about twenty minutes and then went to Ollie's back porch to rehydrate with some cold drinks and good conversation.

On Saturday, October 13 Lions Carl Gilbert, Dick Maurer, Catherine Violette, and Ollie Wittig traveled to the Maryland School For The Blind for the District's semi-annual sorting. The gymnasium at MSB had been set up with long tables, empty cartons and about 100 cartons of eyeglasses that had been collected by clubs all over the District. About fifty Lions were in attendance and the work began. Sorters were given instructions to separate glasses into different cartons-prescription eyeglasses and sunglasses, regular sunglasses, and eyeglass cases. The sorting went on for about 90 minutes and the stacks of donated glasses dropped. As each carton was filled it

was taken to a side table where Lion Joey Livingston taped and marked them for shipment. Eyeglasses will go to a facility where they will be sanitized, graded, and prepared for shipment to third world countries to help the poor residents improve life with better vision. Vision projects are a major program for Lions clubs and collecting evealasses for donation to less fortunate individuals is beneficial. An exact tally of glasses collected and sorted is not known but an estimate of nearly 50,000 pairs seemed reasonable. This program is another example of Lions living up to the motto, "We Serve",
